Governor's Message

My Fellow Kiwanians

Each Kiwanis year, the Governor is often tasked with many challenges. This year is no exception. Our growth in membership is critical to the future health and prosperity of our District. Currently, our District is comprised of 6,760 members in 245 clubs from Eastern Canada and throughout the Caribbean. However, as of April this year, our membership growth is growing too slowly leaving us at risk again of declining membership by our fiscal year end on September 30th.

With this in mind, I created a District Ad Hoc Advisory Committee to advise the District on developing some additional strategic direction for membership growth. The Formula Team led by Chair DLG Lloyd Distant, Jr., and Vice Chair PG Joanne Murray are working hard to develop a solid strategy around club growth and member retention. As you know, my goal was to increase membership by more than 1,000 new members. Our year-to-date results show a growth of only 370 new members since the beginning of our fiscal year on October 1st. Your Lieutenant-Governors' are being asked to speak directly with each of their club leaders around recruiting new members and inviting friends and family to join Kiwanis.



On Thursday, May 18th at the Opening Ceremony of our District Convention in Ottawa, I will be announcing a new Membership Initiative to be launched for the remainder of this fiscal year, from May 1st to September 30th. Please look for further information to be sent out to all Members directly and to our LG's for 2016-17.

In addition, on May 7-9th, we will be holding a Club Membership Drive in Grimsby, Ontario, Canada with many Kiwanians from Eastern Canada coming to participate in the Drive and to create and start a new Kiwanis Club for Division 6. As well, LG Eric Gonneau, PLG Rick Brooks and LDC Ralph Celentano are about to Charter a new Kiwanis Club in Huntsville, Ontario as part of our drive to bring Kiwanis to these communities.

Let's get together and continue to do the good work of Kiwanis in our communities by forming new Kiwanis clubs and strengthening our Membership in order to *"Energize The Dream that every child will be happy, healthy, safe and loved!!"*

Think you know your Kiwanis District's History?



William George Barker

November 15, 1916 Canadian pilot William George Barker flying over Ancre River, spots a concentration of German troops massing for a counter-attack on Beaumont Hamel, he sends an emergency Zone Call to break apart the German infantry. Barker later receives the Military Cross.

On that same day, The Kiwanis Club of Hamilton, Inc. was chartered and celebrated with a 15-page spread in the Hamilton Spectator devoted to the purpose of Kiwanis.



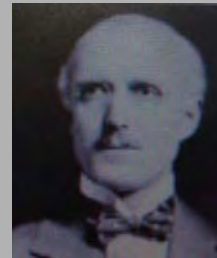
December 22, 1917 – The Ottawa Club was organized and chartered on April 11, 1918. Ottawa was the 74th club in Kiwanis to be formed. One of the first clubs to be sponsored by Ottawa that is still active today is the Pembroke Club, chartered on June 22, 1922. Did you know that the Prince of Wales was given an Honourary Membership from the Ottawa club in 1919??

1917-1918

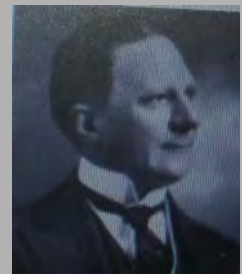
March 8, 1917 – KI President George F. Hixon presented the charter to the second Kiwanis Club in Canada – Toronto. At the convention held in Providence Rhode Island in June, 1918,

George H. Ross of the Toronto club was elected 3rd Vice President of KI. He later served as Kiwanis International President.

February 17, 1918 – The Kiwanis Club of Montreal became the 80th Kiwanis Club formed. The charter President, Henry J. Elliott, became the first Canadian to be elected President of Kiwanis International.

There were 1,200 participants for an evening of high energy excitement and fun. Attendees try to outdo each other with their best costumes, vying for prizes from our local and international partners, such as KLM, Insel, Aruba, and Suriname Airlines, Renaissance, Hilton, and Holiday Inn Resorts, local food and beverage providers, and many, many more.

For months, Kiwanis was visible in a variety of ways leading up to this event and people started asking about tickets well in advance. Media coverage included "on air" interviews, inside the island's Carnival book explaining our event and impact, radio, email blasts to past attendees and social media.

The impact on the community could not be bigger, as this year's gross receipts are quite indicative of each year's ability to raise in excess of \$145,000, which translates into sponsorship of our Service Leadership Programs (Builder's Club, Key Club, and Circle K), our Terrific Kids program, our Child Seat Program, our Santa Claus event, the Back to School project, and much more availability of funds to various sport, social, and educational organizations on the island.



Our Signature Project is one that brings together the members of our club in many ways through the activities leading up to the event, such as the PR and Marketing of the event, the organization and setup, and of course, those spending the evening to ensure the guests enjoy themselves. In addition to being a terrific fundraiser, the public relations and marketing surrounding the event have proven to be a highly successful recruitment tool for new members.

Over 30 of our members were in attendance this year, along with family, friends and community volunteers to ensure that our 4 brass bands, 3 top island musical groups, and attendees had a flawless event filled with 7,000 balloons, glow sticks, and never-before-seen lights effect on the dance floor, excellent food and beverage selection...dancing well into the wee hours of the night.

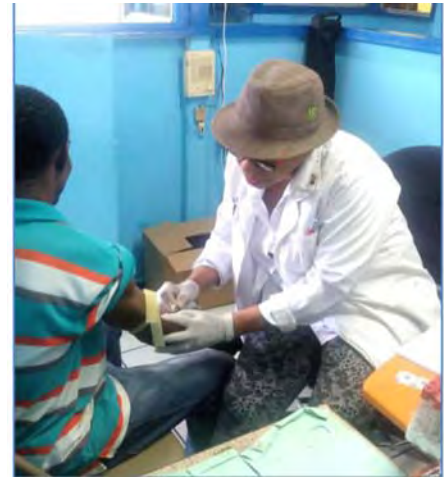

KCNK Health Fair 2017

On Saturday March 25, 2017, the Kiwanis Club of New Kingston hosted its annual Health Fair in partnership with National Health Fund, National Family Planning Board, Jamaica cancer Society, Lions Club of Kingston Jamaica Association for the Deaf, Bio Medical and St. John's Ambulance at the Stella Maris Foundation on Grants Pen Road.



Approximately 130 persons benefitted from testing of blood pressure, cholesterol, blood sugar, eyes, pap smear, STI and HIV. Counselling was also given by Mrs. Rosie Stone and Mr. Ashraf Muqtaviv on the various STIs, how to recognize them, treatment and prevention.
