DID YOU KNOW?

Since 1940, the Kiwanis Children's Fund has helped Kiwanians extend their impact—in their own hometowns and around the world. We do this by developing resources that transform the goodwill and vision of Kiwanians into programs that serve the children of the world. One of the ways we make it happen is our Club Grant program.

For the Children's Fund, a grant does more than fill a funding gap. It's a collaboration. Grant funding helps address an unmet need of children through a project that provides long-term benefits sustained by a club. Clubs interested in applying for a grant should review the program material carefully to learn about the Kiwanis Children's Fund as a potential funding partner.

Important dates

For June 1 funding decisions:

- Submit Letter of Inquiry (LOI) any time before February 1
- If approved, submit full application by April 1

For October 1 funding decisions:

- Submit LOI any time before June 1
- If approved, submit full application by August 1

For January 1 funding decisions:

- Submit LOI any time before September 1
- If approved, submit full application by November 1

Some of the clubs benefitting in January 2019

Special Olympics Bowling

The Kiwanis Club of the Islips and Bay Shore, New York, received a grant to expand its work with children with severe disabilities at its local school district. This grant will allow them to form a Special Olympics Bowling League, and the Kiwanians will be trained to serve as coaches, assisting students during the 10-week season. The money will be used to pay for lane fees, shoe rental, as well as an award ceremony and celebration at the end of the season.

Kiwanis Family Safety Day Rodeo

Every year, the Kiwanis Club of Berlin, New Hampshire, holds a Bike Rodeo & Family Safety Day. Members perform bike inspections, make minor repairs and fit children and adults with free bike and all-sports helmets. The club also works with the local police department to make sure bikes are registered. This year, the grant from the Children's Fund will allow the club to purchase 225 helmets.

The Playground Effect

Many local pre-schools lack basic playground equipment. The grant will allow the Kiwanis Club of Providence-Montego Bay, Jamaica, to erect swings, monkey bars and slides for children ages three to five. The playground equipment will allow schools to be certified by Jamaica's Early Childhood Commission. The club plans to hold annual fundraising barbeques to pay for upkeep and improvements.

Every Child a Swimmer

A grant from the Children's Fund will allow the Kiwanis Club of Silverton, Oregon, to fulfill its goal of providing free swimming lessons to all third-graders from area elementary schools. At least 300 students will be bused from their schools to the local YMCA to learn water safety and swimming. The club has been helping kids learn to swim for 12 years.

CHRISTMAS ORNAMENTS SECURE BREAKFAST FOR CHILDREN



In November 2018, Kiwanis Club of Aruba launched its Christmas ornament project. This project was an initiative of Past Lieutenant Governor Giantonio Muller which was executed in the last Kiwanis Year for all the clubs in Division 26. This year Kiwanis Club of Aruba continued with the project.

The idea behind the project is to request donation of AWG 25.00/USD14.00 for the local foundation 'Ban Uni Man pa Cria Nos Muchanan'. With these funds, the foundation can provide breakfast for 1 month for less privileged children. For each donation of AWG 25.00/USD 14.00 made, the person receives a unique and limited edition Kiwanis Christmas ornament.

The foundation 'Ban Uni Man pa Cria Nos Muchanan' provides breakfast on a daily basis to needy school children in Aruba. Currently, the foundation delivers breakfast to around 600 elementary school children on the island on a daily basis. The funds raised through this project will provide the foundation with the much needed funds to continue financing its growing operations as there is a waiting list for more children to receive breakfast.

There were several outlets on the island where the ornaments were made available to the public to make their donation and also through the club members. The project was well received by the community and the business on the island.



EC&C District Key Leader Programme

The Eastern Canada and Caribbean District has supported the Key Leader program for over 10 years. In the fall 2018, five very successful Key Leader camps were held in Eastern Canada, specifically... one in New Brunswick, two in Nova Scotia, and two in Ontario. The sixth camp planned for the Bahamas was postponed until 2019. There were 311 students in attendance and 52 adult volunteers covering 5 camps.

Thanks to all the adult volunteers and the cadre of Lead Facilitators who made each Key Leader camp a success and saw our inspired youth and future leaders leave with ideas and excitement on how they can improve their communities and schools. Thanks also for the financial support received from the many Kiwanis Clubs involved and to our own Kiwanis Foundation of Canada.

We are planning to hold seven Key Leader camps in 2019 in the District, six in Eastern Canada and one in the Bahamas. In the future, plans are afoot to expand the Key Leader program into Quebec, Canada, Aruba/ Curacao and Jamaica.

KIWANIS CLUB ALLEVIATES SOME FEARS FOR FAMILIES AFFECTED BY U.S. GOVERNMENT SHUTDOWN

When paychecks for federal employees don't come today, their kids will still get a nutritious meal at school. The Kiwanis Club of Elmhurst will cover lunch expenses for the kids of any family feeling the pinch of the government shutdown.

The club is prepared to donate whatever is needed to make sure every student gets lunch. "We started this about 10 years ago, during the recession, when we learned kids who didn't have lunch money were going without lunch," said Rich Rosenberg of the program the club calls Food for Thought.

A long-time member of the Kiwanis Club of Elmhurst, Rosenberg says, "The circumstances with the government have changed the game. Funds might not be available for lunch money."

"The Kiwanis Club of Elmhurst saw a community need and responded, which is just what Kiwanis clubs do," said Stan Soderstrom, executive director of Kiwanis International. "Kids need Kiwanis to look out for them and help meet their needs."

Elmhurst is a western suburb of Chicago, near O'Hare International Airport, a busy passenger and freight hub where federal employees work in a variety of roles, such as TSA agents, FAA controllers and cargo inspectors. "We're 22 miles west of Chicago, with a lot of commuters," Rosenberg said.

The Kiwanis club's annual pancake breakfast raises \$9,000 to \$12,000 annually to cover the lunch project and other projects that help kids. The project costs \$1,500 to \$2,000 yearly.

"We figure we provide 250 meals every semester, maybe 500 meals annually. We have no idea who the children are, and they are only told that the money was provided by the Kiwanis Club of Elmhurst," he said.



Rosenberg said the school's social workers help identify children who could benefit from the free lunch. "This in no way replaces federal support or food stamps," he said. "We just serve kids whose mom or dad may be

short for a one reason or another. The kid walks through the lunch line like every other child."

"Food insecurity is a real factor in many communities. Elmhurst Community Unit School District 205 and York High School are fortunate to have great partners like the Elmhurst Kiwanis Club to fill in the gaps," said Bev Redmond, D205 executive director of Communications and PR. "The Food for Thought program helps eliminate hunger as a barrier to learning, allowing students to focus on getting a great education."

When Rosenberg was a part-time teacher at the high school, he learned first-hand how teachers helped kids who didn't have lunch money. "Snack companies used to donate outdated merchandise to the schools, and teachers could provide that and a bottle of water to kids who didn't have lunch money," he said. "When laws changed, kids would be forced to ask another student to share a lunch, or sometimes teachers would help with personal funds. Our club started Food for Thought to fill in the gap."



No matter how well an economy is doing there will always be a sector of people who will go hungry on a daily basis. The Kiwanis Club of Fort Montagu knows this firsthand after conducting a community assessment. There are a number of seniors residing in New Providence as well as mothers with young children who do not have access to basic grocery. It is for this reason President Chandra implemented 'Meals on Wheels' as one of this year's club goals to address this need.



The Meals on Wheels kicked off Saturday October 13, 2018, starting out as meals on wheels but ending up as "meals on legs" as we walked through the neighborhoods to serve persons.

The Kiwanis Club of Fort Montagu will celebrate 55 years of serving the community hence, 55 grocery packages were distributed and 55 volunteers coupled with youngsters from our Service Leadership Programs assisted with the packaging and distribution. The SLPs



along with faculty advisors who represented were Nassau Christian Academy Key Club and Builders Club, Queen's College Key Club and Aquinas College Key Club. Together we can accomplish so much more and for this reason the partnership is developed and maintained between each branch of the Kiwanis Family, hence the Builders Club and Key Club participated in the club's first 'Meals on Wheels' project.

We also had four prospects who have shown interest in serving. It was truly an awesome experience for them as they along with the SLP members got their feet right into it. We can collectively increase the amount of lives we touch through service and even touch our own lives.

We extend thanks to the Royal Bahamas Police Force in conjunction with Urban Renewal who assisted in locating a number of persons in need. Not only did we distribute groceries, but the children talked, prayed and encouraged the seniors as well.

The success of the Meals on Wheels also comes from the willingness and generosity of our sponsors who contribute to our fundraisers which make it possible to deliver. The Kiwanis Club of Fort Montagu will deliver 55 packages each quarter of this year and hopefully this can be a recurring project for the club.

DIVISION 23 EAST FOOD BANK

Division 23 East, in collaboration with the Abilities Foundation, the leading institution in Jamaica and the Caribbean dedicated to providing quality vocational training to Persons with Disabilities, recently launched a Food Bank to address the challenge of food insecurity impacting Persons with Disabilities and their families at Abilities Foundation and surrounding communities.

This Food Bank seeks to:

- Identify and develop a register of beneficiaries at the Abilities Foundation
- Liaise with the Ministry of Labour and Social Security and the Jamaica Council for Persons with Disabilities to identify the elderly with disabilities in the Constant Spring area, children and youth with disabilities, families receiving PATH and other public assistance.
- Collaborate with Public, Private and International stakeholders to mobilize a food drive
- Collect sort and store donated food items
- Establish Abilities Foundation as a Food Distribution Site via networks and social media
- Provide clients in need with nutritional support through collaborations with Kiwanis International, Food for the Poor and faith based organizations.
- Provide skills training to Students of Abilities Foundation (who will assist in operating the Food Bank), in the stock taking, inventory management and distribution.

Some of the Goals and Objectives of this Initiative are already in progress, with the retrofitting of 2 containers, one to be used for storage and the other for distribution; and soliciting commitments from various Stakeholders for a continuous supply of food items to the initiative. Commitments have been received from Jamaica National Bank, the Poverty Alleviation and Empowerment Foundation, Food for the Poor and Jamaica Broilers. The Division continues to seek sponsorship from other corporate entities. In addition,

support was received from Gustazos.com, a social media group that has reached out for donations on the Division's behalf for the Food Bank, while the clubs in the Division are putting their resources together to provide cash and food items to help stock the Food Bank.

At the Launch in December, 2018, Mrs. Janice Robinson Longmore of Jamaica National Bank, one of the sponsors, lauded Kiwanians for the

initiative, saying "it is clear that members of the Kiwanis club won't be limited to seasons such as Christmastime in their support to empower the disabled, humanize them, and position them to make their contributions to our country". The Guest Speaker at the Launch, Ms. Christine Hendricks of the Jamaica Council for Persons with Disabilities, also highlighted the importance of the Food Bank Initiative by Kiwanians and the contribution it will make to encourage better inclusion of the disabled in our society.

The Division hopes to be able to completely stock food items in the retrofitted container and to commence the first tranche of food distribution to persons with disabilities in January, 2019.

HATS, MITTS AND BOOTS

In November of 1986, Kiwanian Steve Small was approached by a friend who was a public school Principal about some of his students who were coming to school not suitably dressed for the cold Canadian weather. After meeting with the teachers and school staff Steve asked of Durham A M Kiwanis Club Board of Directors for a \$600 budget to help these children.

The project was called "Hats, Mitts and Boots". By November 1988, through word of mouth, six schools were involved and the budget grew to \$5000 and Kiwanis Club of Oshawa was buying socks, underwear, leggings, snow pants, winter coats and other items suggested by teachers and staff, often targeting individual students.

After 27 years at the \$5000 per year budget level, and the help of a number of our club members including Steve Small, Ron Phillips and Dick Snowden, (plus the rest of the Club re fundraising), the budget was increased to over \$7000 and Kiwanian Al Jones and his wife Lorraine started leading the project. Lorraine visits the managers of many local clothing stores and gets the best value for money and store managers would let her know when the sales are on and tell her about year-end bargains. As a result, the value of the purchase is doubled or even tripled. Over the past 33 years, the club has spent over \$164,575.00, which because of careful spending has acquired approximately triple that amount in merchandise and now serves 6 public schools in the community and a disabled parents children's group.



Lorraine stores the goods at her home and when school officials notify her of their needs, she and Al deliver the clothing to the school where the teachers see that the needy students are looked after.

At a recent Christmas Breakfast meeting, the Club awarded Al Jones the "Kiwanian of the Year" Award for his work chairing the project; and his helpful assistant, his wife Lorraine who actually does most of the work, was awarded Honourary Membership in the Club. Also, Carolyn Thomas, wife of Kiwanian Craig Thomas, was awarded Honourary Membership for contributing over 100 sets of hand knitted hats, scarfs and mitts for needy children.
