Signature projects show the impact a Kiwanis club can have on a community. From playgrounds and parks to festivals and fundraisers, signature projects are the hallmarks of what Kiwanis clubs are known for in their communities.

Every year, Kiwanis International recognizes the best signature projects from around the world. Each district selects its top signature project for judging. For the 2020 competition, two contest tiers were established. Clubs with 27 members or fewer were judged in Tier I while clubs with 28 members or more were judged in Tier II.

The Eastern Canada and Caribbean District Committee signature project contest closed with a successful eighty three (83) submisions. Kiwanis International received 378 project submissions from 43 district, with ECC sumitting the greatests amount. A specail thanks to all of the clubs that submitted. The projects were exciting and it was a difficult task selecting our winners. There were three top winners in each category. These clubs will be awarded at the District Covention date to be announced.

We extend heartiest congratulations to Tier 1 winner; The Kiwanis Club of Brampton and Tier 11 Winner; The Kiwanis Club of Brantford. *Their projects* were submitted in the Kiwanis International contest; however, we were not successful in making the top 10 finalists.

On behalf of our District Governor Robert Spellen we extend congratulations to the International finalists. TWEED KIWANIS AND MUNICIPALITY PARTNER ON ACCESSIBLE PLAYGROUND PROJECT



he Kiwanis Club of Tweed and the Municipality of Tweed are excited about their partnership on a significant project to upgrade and add new equipment to the playground in Memorial Park. The plan includes a variety of equipment that specializes in engaging sensory, motor, cognitive and social skills, including spinners, swings, panels, slides, ladders and a zipline. Improvements will be made to general playground equipment, and rubber surfaces will be used in various locations within the playground.

Kiwanian Jim Hanna, who chairs the Playground Committee, says ""Every child should be able to access a playground and not have to watch from the sidelines as others play. This playground is designed to do just that – children and others of all ages will be able to come to the park to relax and enjoy the playground on the water in the heart of Tweed." Mayor Jo-Anne Albert added "The Municipality welcomes the opportunity to work together with Kiwanis on the playground project, which will be a great asset for our residents and visitors. I am confident we will be able to make this project a reality – we have a very generous community". Kiwanis Club of Tweed President Chris Foran concluded "We are excited as a Club, and for the community, but especially for kids using wheelchairs or other mobility devices".

The upgraded playground is targeted for completion in 2020/21. A campaign to raise funds for this project, estimated at a cost of approximately \$400,000, was kicked off at the annual Christmas party fundraiser at the home of Kiwanian Don DeGenova and Dr. Charles Mustard. Over \$20,000 was donated that November evening, including \$5,000 contributions from both the Kiwanis Club of Tweed and from DeGenova/Mustard. Since that time, a total of over \$86,000 has been donated or committed by community members, businesses, service clubs and the Municipality to this important project. Most recently, the 'Family Feud', a community group that runs annual hockey and slo-pitch tournaments, made a generous donation of \$5,000. Government and public grant opportunities are being sought, and community groups, businesses, and individuals are invited to support this worthwhile cause. While this special project is underway, the Kiwanis Club of Tweed will continue to fund other community initiatives.

Cheques payable to the 'Municipality of Tweed', noting 'Kiwanis Playground' in the memo, can be dropped off to the Municipal office at 255 Metcalf St., or mailed to Postal Bag 729, Tweed ON, K0K 3J0. 'Donation certificates' are now available for purchase at the Municipal office to make a contribution in any amount in that special someone's name. All businesses, organizations and individuals who make donations will be acknowl-

edged on signage at the playground, and receive a tax receipt for contributions over \$10. In the case of donation certificates, the recipients name will be included on the signage; the purchaser will receive a tax receipt.



Philanthropist donates land to Kiwanis Foundation of Jamaica

t was a momentous day in the life of the Kiwanis Club of Montego Bay, the Kiwanis Foundation of Jamaica (KFJ) and by extension, the Kiwanis movement in Jamaica, as longstanding member and Distinguished President of the Kiwanis Club of Montego Bay, Giusseppi (Pino) Maffessanti, presented President of the KFJ, Abdon Campbell, with the title for a piece of land he donated to the Foundation.

The land, which is in Unity Hall, St. James, is to be developed into the KFJ Western Regional Kiwanis Service Centre.

A developer and builder, Giuseppe is known for his philanthropist endeavours as in the past he sub-divided a parcel of his land and distributed to 32 families.

Maffessanti was bestowed with the Order of Jamaica (OJ) in 2018 for his contribution to the construction sector, social development and welfare and philanthropy.

Migrated to Jamaica from Bergamo, Italy in the early 50s with his mother and joined his father a former World War 11 prisoner of war who had settled in the island and started a construction business which he later inherited.

President of the Kiwanis Club of Montego Bay, Teisha-Ann Pinnock along with President of the KFJ, Abdon Campbell and some Kiwanian stalwarts, who were instrumental in driving the process, were on hand to witness the official handover of the title.

Sharing in the moment were Past Kiwanis International Foundation President, Godfrey Dyer; Distinguished Governor Trevor Dunn; Lieutenant Governor, Division 25 K. Lorraine Bailey-Wright; Past District Trustee Veviene McDonald Calder; Distinguished Lieutenant Governors of Excellence, Kermitt McGann and Lloyd Distant (Snr.); Distinguished Lieutenant Governors Ainsworth Palmer; Dwight Lawrence, Barrington Watson and Distinguished President of the Kiwanis Club of Stony Hill, Sharon Usim, who was the Attorney at Law instrumental in the process of getting the title issued.

The land which is now worth millions of dollars was offered by DP Pino to the KFJ in 2007. It was Pino's dream to put this piece of land to use through the KFJ and the board accepted with the intention to establish the KFJ Western Regional Kiwanis Service Centre with facilities for clubs to hold meetings, functions, training and Kiwanis sponsored community activities.

The centre would be required to generate income to ensure viability with the primary proceeds benefiting Kiwanis and Community efforts.



A Song for Road Safety

ver the years a concerning trend has been noticed amongst children while using the roads in Barbados. In an effort to curb this trend, Kiwanis Club Pride of Barbados hosted a Road Safety Competition for Primary Schools running from October 21, 2019 to November 29, 2019. The aim of the competition was to educate the children on proper road usage while allowing them to use their talents to express themselves.

It was hoped that at the end of the campaign the island's children would be better able to use the roads safely and in addition would all know the:

Road signs and their meanings

Eye and Sight Day at the Homestead Place of Safety

he Eye Education and Screening Day was the first of several monthly planned activities for the Homestead Place of Safety, a state care housing 70 girls and which has been adopted by the Kiwanis Club of New Kingston for the administrative year.

The eye sight day was to:

Educate the girls on proper care of the eye

Perform diagnostic eye testing Provide reading glasses where required Conduct blood pressure and sugar test

Dr Renae Badroe Ophthalmologist, the guest speaker, delivered a very instructive and engaging presentation which included:

- 1. The role of the eye
- 2. The parts of the eye and their function
- 3. Some of the common conditions that affect the eyes

The project was done in collaboration with The Lions Club of Mona, who provided vision screening, blood pressure and sugar testing. Over sixty -five (65) girls were tested and thirty- six (36) received reading glasses. Referrals were also done for elevated blood sugar and visual acuity.

In attendance were Lieutenant Governor (LG) Barrington Whyte, approximately nineteen (19) Kiwanians, seven (7) Edna Manley Circle K members and four (4) guests. Richmond public safety heroes: Brandon Hodges

Day and night our public safety heroes answer the call, working tirelessly to prevent crime and save lives. When they're not doing that, they're working with at-risk local youth or neighborhood councils. For them it's all part of the job. In early March, before the COVID-19 shelter-in-place order went into effect, the Kiwanis Club of Richmond in partnership with Chevron Richmond honored some of the people who are keeping the city safe at its annual Public Safety Awards Dinner. Amid the COVID-19 public health crisis, the Standard will highlight each of the honorees as a reminder of the sacrifices made by frontline responders.

Brandon Hodges, Police Office of the Year If LeBron James, winner of three NBA titles, is considered the G.O.A.T. (Greatest of All Time) in basketball, then Brandon Hodges may be in the running for the same distinction in policing.

For a third year in a row, Officer Hodges has been named Police Officer of the Year by his peers. Like LeBron James, the officer has plenty of numbers to back him up. Last year, Officer Hodges recovered 23 firearms, made 75 arrests and handled multiple important cases that made the community safer. With help from his canine partner Gunnar, Hodges also apprehended more than 40 suspects. Thirty-two of them surrendered just knowing that the dog was present. In 2018, Hodges was recognized for recovering 30 firearms and making 61 arrests.

That's not all. Officer Hodges has also made the city safer by addressing many quality of life issues in his beat, providing homeless outreach services and tackling some of the blight issues in neighborhoods. He arranged for the towing of over 100 abandoned vehicles in 2019.

Despite these achievements, Officer Hodges remains humble. In accepting his trifecta award, "he made it a point to recognize his wife, who stays home and takes care of their two little ones," said recently retired Richmond police Capt. Joey Schlemmer, who remains active in the community.

"It can be tough at times balancing a career and family life, and they seem to be doing it pretty well," Schlemmer said.
